

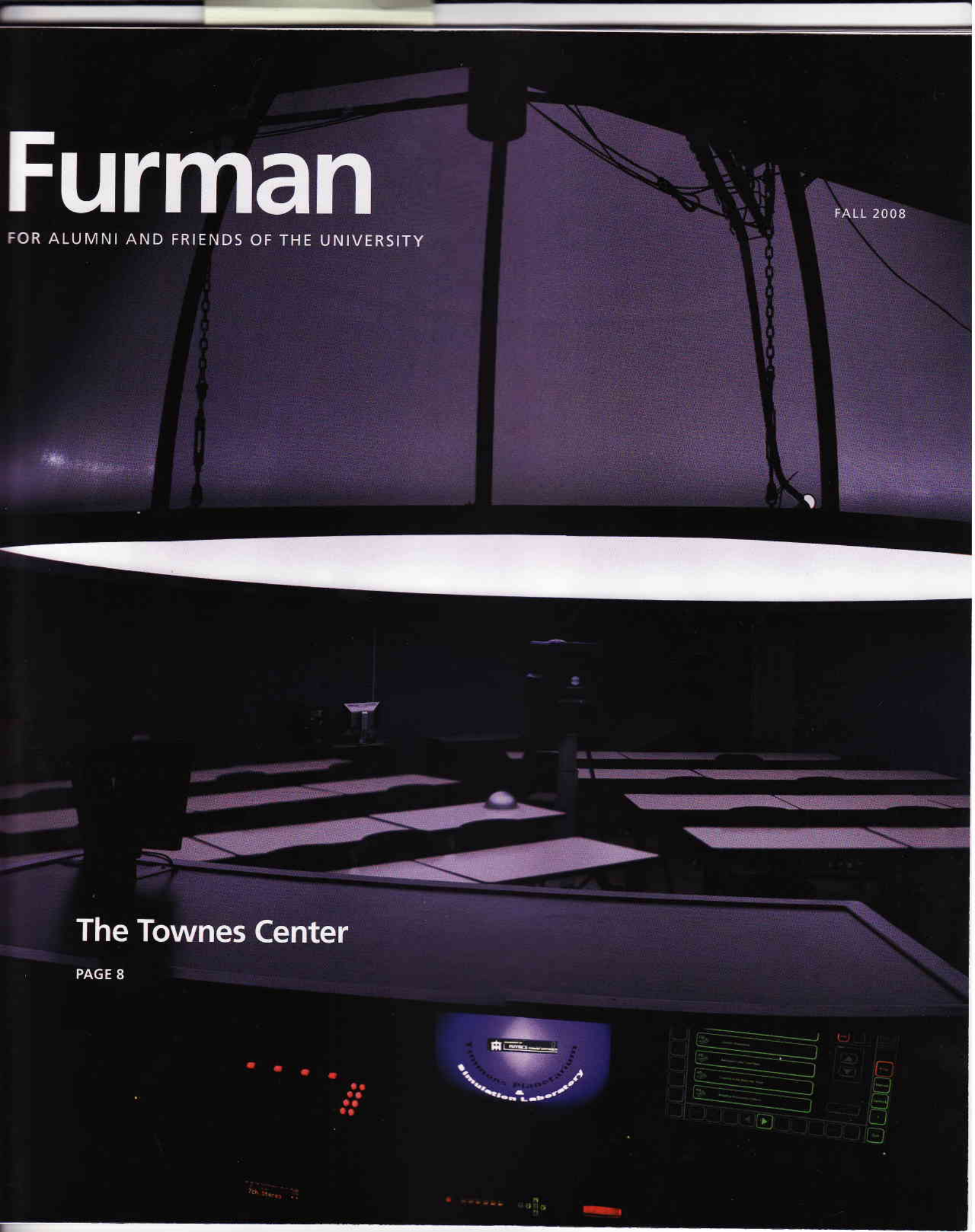

JACKSON EARNS FUTURE INTERNATIONAL EDUCATOR AWARD

Shelly Jackson feels most in her element when she's completely out of her element — whether she's swabbing decks on a 50-foot sailing vessel in the Netherlands Antilles, corralling hens at an organic farm in New Zealand or building adobe huts in New Mexico.

She's curious about people and places, loves to explore, reveres history and culture, and wants to share her knowledge with others.

She's also the 2008 winner of the Future International Educator/Alumni of the Year award, presented annually to an outstanding alum of the AustraLearn/AsiaLearn/EuroLearn study abroad programs. The recipient must have a desire to work in the field of international education.

Jackson, a 2006 Furman graduate and 2005 veteran of the AustraLearn program, was recognized in May at the National Association for Foreign Student Affairs conference, a gathering of international education professionals held in Washington, D.C. Not long after the conference, she accepted a position as assistant director of the American Institute for Foreign Study, working out of the organization's San Francisco office. Her primary role is to promote study abroad and cultural exchange programs to AIFS partner institutions and students.

Bill Lavery, former director of international education and professor emeritus of history at Furman, helped Jackson arrange to participate in the AustraLearn program. He says he isn't surprised she was chosen for the honor: "If we could plug wires into her, we'd have a renewable energy source."

In an essay about her study abroad experience, which was part of her application for the award, Jackson wrote, "I don't look at traveling as a holiday or a trip. I look at it as a learning experience and a way to understand the world better. I don't think that's something you can get out of your system. It's a part of me."

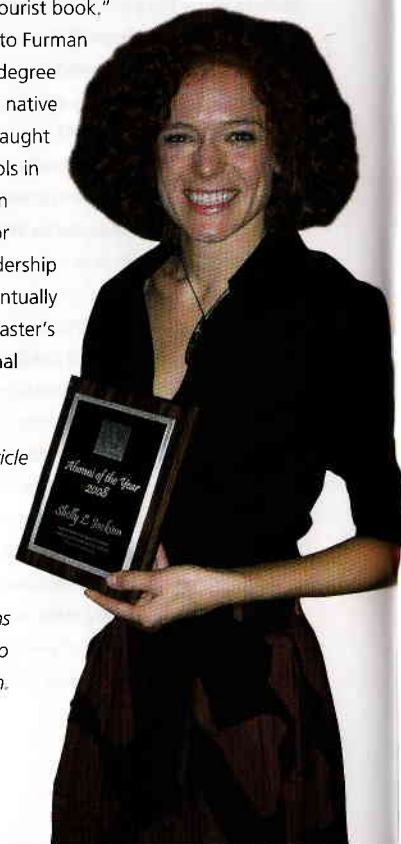
During her five months in New Zealand, where she studied at Victoria University of Wellington, Jackson says she was determined to live as a resident, not as a visitor. "You can learn a lot from anyone who comes across your path," she says. "It was the first time I actually lived in another country. The other times, I traveled."

One of her most intense experiences came on the Bay of Islands, where she worked on an organic farm. In exchange for room and board, she was able to learn about the environmental challenges facing the country's agricultural economy.

"They are one of the most green, organically concerned environments in the world," she says. "I wanted to see that firsthand rather than just read about it in my tourist book."

After returning to Furman and completing her degree in history, Jackson, a native of Fort Worth, Fla., taught English in rural schools in France and worked in Washington, D.C., for a national youth leadership conference. She eventually hopes to pursue a master's degree in international education.
